Name: Parochial Church Council of St Lawrence, Bourton on the Water with St James, Clapton on the Hill.

Location: St Lawrence Church is situated in Bourton on the Water at one end of the High Street, set back from the road. St James is in the centre of the village of Clapton on the Hill. The parish is part of a wider Benefice, including the villages of Great, Little and Wyck Rissington and is in the Diocese of Gloucester, and part of the Church of England.

In April 2024 we are looking to fill **3 vacancies** on the PCC (for 3 years). Given that we are now in vacancy, PCC agreed in January 2024 that any current members due to retire this year who wish to stand for immediate re-election, may do so in order to give stability and continuity.

Structure, governance & management of the PCC

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC. The PCC is a charity, excepted from registration with the Charity Commission under the Charities (Exception from Registration) Regulations 1996.

Objectives & Activities

Under the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measures 1956, the PCC has the responsibility of cooperating with the incumbent in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities for St Lawrence's Church and St James' Church.

The Parish of Bourton on the Water with Clapton has also adopted the following local purpose statement:-

"To receive God's love in our lives, To be Christ's love in the world."

PCC Review of the Year - 2023

The PCC met 11 times during 2023 beginning in January as we continued our study of the book "How Village Churches Thrive". Rev Rowena finished a Church of England Leadership Development course and the Bellringers' fund became a restricted fund under the PCC. In February our Open the Book team undertook online training whilst in March we refined our livestream policy and arranged a BIG church clean before Easter.

In June we purchased a new laptop to enable the livestreaming of services. In July we began the process of completing the Eco-Church survey, to get a baseline idea of what we currently do in readiness for taking this forward in 2024. Clapton financially supported the creation of a Church Trail Leaflet for the Benefice and a leaflet of our church services was produced to be taken to hotels and B&Bs.

In September Rev Rowena was invited to take up a secondment position of Collaborative Ministry Development Advisor within Gloucester Diocese for 7-8 hours a week and PCC supported her in this. We were notified that the North Cotswold Deanery was now a part of the Diocesan Funerals Project – to help streamline the administration involved and make it easier for people to arrange a church funeral. Rev Hannah encouraged us to start making cake for the primary school staffroom!

In October we began to reconsider the reintroduction of a prayer ministry team, but felt it best to proceed properly, with policies and procedures in place before restarting. Due to Rowena's departure this is now on hold until we come out of vacancy.

PCC have chosen a 100% green electricity tariff but are currently continuing with a non-green gas tariff, choosing to prioritise our parish share payments as we cannot afford to do both. We committed to revisiting this decision in 2 years' time. We were advised by the Parish Council that Memorial Stability Testing would take place in the churchyard in January 2024 (one memorial has been laid flat, another is to be maintained in April 2024).

In November, we were gifted a mobile Bluetooth speaker and microphones by Patrick and Julie Smith which has been used on the Green for a couple of Christmas Carol events (one school, one church) thus far. PCC agreed to the running of the Bereavement Journey Course from January 2024 and has had a Quinquennial inspection. We have had intermittent trouble with both Wi-Fi and the sum-up contactless giving machine during the year, but both are working again now.

On 9th November we learnt that Rev Rowena was leaving us in February 2024 to take up the position of Canon Missioner at Lincoln Cathedral. This was a huge surprise in the moment, but reading this yearly summary suggests maybe we should have been more prepared for her moving on!

In December we heard that the numbers attending Tuesday warm space had increased from 4 to 10 families.

Additionally this year, in April we had a meeting to discuss Living in Love & Faith - a Church of England conversation which has been taking place during the last 5 years around how the church responds to the LGBTQIA+ community. PCC want to emphasise our intention to be an inclusive church family in the richest sense, showing our love and inclusivity primarily through attitudes and actions, rather than through formal statements of intention in the first instance. This approach includes our use of liturgy for family-friendly Communion and Baptism services etc, as well as liturgy for same-sex blessings. The PCC proposed and approved the following statement:

"We desire to be a welcoming and inclusive church community. Therefore, the PCC supports [the rector] acting on behalf of the Benefice, in using any of the Church of England liturgy authorised for use now and in the future."

PCC have had another busy and productive year!

Minister's Report 2023

It feels strange to be writing a report I won't be here to deliver, yet equally it is an affirming and encouraging task to do in my final weeks in post, as I take time to reflect on and give thanks for all the ways the communities here at St Lawrence and St James have lived the Gospel in worship, prayer, welcome and outreach across 2023. I hope you find that same sense of gratitude and appreciation for our life together in reading this report as I have in writing it.



Some numbers:

Worship:

- We spoke a message of love and hope in the midst of grief through 25 funerals, 6 interments of ashes and our annual Living with Loss bereavement course.
- We celebrated God's love with 2 wedding couples, their family and friends.
- We celebrated welcome into God's family with 8 baptisms.
- An extra 7 households on average join services at St Lawrence each week through our livestream. (2677 views/ 318.1hrs of viewing)
- The average Sunday attendance increased across the year and is now quite similar to pre-COVID as were Christmas attendances. The Carols on the Green remains successful and seems to draw in different people to the Carols service in church.
- Celebrated seasonal worship including the Rogationtide Parish Pilgrimage, and the Benefice Easter Dawn service and Ascension Day services and party both held at Clapton Barn.
- Clapton saw good numbers again at their festival services (Harvest and Christmas)

Discipleship and Nurture:

A variety of activities took place across the year alongside our regular prayer meetings and home groups. They included:

- Lent study groups
- Gill's series of seasonal musical reflections, which were well received by the 10-20 people who attended each time and provided a prayerful space to pause and reflect.
- Book Group looking at Inspired by Rachel Held Evans
- Welcoming Susan Stein to perform the Etty Play
- Advent Quiet morning reflecting on Mary and the Magnificat

Children and Young People

- Our Youth Club continued to flourish under Hannah's leadership drawing up to 12 teenagers along each month. One particular highlight was the Greystone's bat walk led by Megan from the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust.
- BumbleBeez continues to support around 15 tots and their carers each week and is always a joy to drop in on.
- Light Group continues to have fun and learn about Jesus during our 11am Communion services, drawing in up to 5 or 6 primary school children on some weeks.
- Breakfast Church continues to draw in up to 40 people of all ages who enjoy the social time connecting over breakfast and the informal worship.
- We began our first St George's Day with the uniformed organisations combined with our 11am worship. This service had stopped altogether during COVID and prior to that had usually happened in the afternoon. Both the Scouts and the congregation enjoyed celebrating together.
- Christian Union continues to run weekly at the Cotswold School, providing a safe place for connection and conversation.
- The Open the Book team continue to tell the Bible story each fortnight to the 250 students and staff from Bourton Primary.
- Hannah took over from Rowena as a school governor at Bourton Primary School and continues to build and maintain a close relationship with the school.
- Rowena gave a week of Easter assemblies to all 1500 students at the Cotswold school.

Outreach and Community

- Together on Tuesdays continued to provide a space for people to connect over a homemade soup lunch, drawing 20-35 people each week.
- Warm Welcome Space continues to grow and flourish and now brings together 15-20 primary school children and carers each Tuesday after school. If you are interested in being a part of this outreach, do speak to Hannah as she is looking to build a team to continue this important ministry.
- We continue to support many local groups and activities through the use of our building and facilities, including our partnership with the Catholic church who use our church for a midweek service.
- We have continued to support Christian Aid, Headspace, the North Cotswold Foodbank, Kate's Home Nursing, the Royal British Legion and The Children's Society through our fundraising events.
- We have begun to provide the Explore range of prayer cards to encourage and invite our visitors to pray.
- We developed and printed our 5 Churches Trail Benefice Walk pamphlet supported by the St James' mission fund.

• Clapton held its first Advent Window trail across the village in December

You can read more about many of these activities and events in the reports below, but I hope this gives you a flavour of just how much of God's Kingdom life happens in our building and among our communities across a single year. Even this list doesn't do justice to all the smaller tasks and roles that people undertake - to tend, clean, arrange flowers, ring bells, mow and garden, smile and welcome, invite, visit, care and support – all of which reflect God's love in our relationships with those around us and through the sacred space of our building.

I feel privileged to have journeyed with you these past 5 and a bit years and will miss you all. However, I know that the love, strength and welcome of this community will continue in and through the vacancy and into the next stage of your life together.

Review of Financial Activities and Affairs

Yet again God has blessed our giving, ending 2023 with a surplus of £610. Isn't God GREAT! It just goes to prove that by all of us getting involved in praying, serving and giving, great things are possible.

So, a big THANK YOU again to all of you who have so generously given, in both large and small amounts, to the ministry work in our Parish over the past 12 months. The work of our Church this year is likely to rise to £100,000 or £1,925 per week. We receive no support from outside sources so your continued giving and fund raising activities are vital to fund the mission and pastoral work in our village and the surrounding area, and it contributes to a continued Christian presence in Bourton. The more we stir each other up in love and faith, the more God multiples our gifts of time and money to do even greater things in our Church and community!

The detail behind the numbers is in the notes attached to the accounts. Significantly, giving to the Church increased by 19%, which helped us increase our contribution to the Parish Share and support the pastoral work and mission in our community.

There are many ways to give to the Church. The most efficient way is through the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS), which now accounts for 70% of our planned giving. Giving through the PGS is very simple, is done on-line and the donor stays in control. It benefits our cash-flow and significantly

reduces the administration time involved in managing the finances. If you would like to know more, then please contact me or click the link in Pews News.

The accounts show donations made to charities that passed through the PCC accounts. Additionally during the year, Church members also supported Christian Aid and the Christmas Toy Appeal. 2024 will bring our biggest challenge yet. We need to find an additional £11,000 to meet the increased costs of energy and our increased commitment to the ministry and mission costs in our community through the Parish Share. Once again, we step out in faith, trusting that God will provide. Please prayerfully consider what else you can give and please also support our fundraising activities. I would like to thank the rest of the team who help with the financial management of the Church – to Brian & Doreen Shakeshaft for continuing to do our banking, to Terryl Lewis, for managing the Gift Aid, to Dave Turnbull for his work as Independent Examiner and to Kevan Taylor for his work with the Benefice finances and reserves policy.

Fabric Report - St Lawrence, Bourton-on-the-Water

A roof survey was carried out by P Morse of Cirencester early in the year as there were several tiles loose in different areas of the roof. They cleaned out the guttering and lead areas to ensure no leaks and replaced the broken or missing tiles.

There was an attempted break in to the meeting room that caused damage to the lock which had to be replaced. The incident was captured on our CCTV and reported to the police and an incident number raised. Although we got a good photo of the person the police decided there was not enough information to proceed with an investigation.

Service works were required on the boilers this year.

A Quinquennial inspection of the registers and paperwork was carried out this summer. Everything was satisfactory and we gained knowledge on how to make the next one easier on everyone. The Quinquennial inspection carried out on the church buildings has also taken place and highlighted repairs we will need to address as a PCC over the coming months/years. A copy is available on request.

The full 5-year electrical inspection was carried out by Bayliss and Higgs who carried out the electrical installation at the time of reordering.

Quite a few tiles on the low boiler roof have broken and will be replaced soon, again by P Morse of Cirencester.

To remain compliant with Fire regulations our fire extinguishers are now sited on stands with correct signage.

All annual servicing has been carried out and the Terrier and Logbook have been checked.

General Report including Fabric - St James, Clapton-on-the-Hill

St James Clapton is still in the process of organising works mentioned in the Quinquennial 2022 and have appointed Toby Falconer Architects Ltd. Toby Falconer has a wealth of experience with Church buildings and he is working closely with us in preparation to start some of the building works in the next 12 months as the weather improves, with appropriate quotes and permissions obtained. Earlier in the year our safe had to be repaired due to a faulty lock. This was completed but was an expense we had not budgeted for.

Having obtained a report on the Bird Cherry Tree in the Churchyard stating it was diseased it was decided that it had to be removed. The relevant permissions were sought and it was agreed we could replace it with a malus transitoria which is a small crab apple tree. This will be completed in the spring.

The relevant inspections have been completed for the Electrical installation and Fire extinguishers with certificates obtained. In July we had our Register inspection which was satisfactory.

We have continued to have another very good year attendance wise and also a lot of visitors from overseas. The prayer cards have proven to be very popular with our congregation and visitors. Once again we had a high turnout for our Easter Services, including a Dawn Service, and Ascension Day. Harvest and the Christmas Carol service also saw the village coming together to worship. Food donations this year have been very generous and are greatly appreciated by the recipients. One of our well supported events was an inaugural Advent Window Trail this was enthusiastically received by the villagers. Rev Hannah and daughter Beth were the judges and the entries were so good that there were two worthy winners, the prize being chocolates and wine.

We continue to be grateful to Peter Tisshaw for his devotion to the maintenance of St James' Churchyard and the memorial garden. May was particularly busy with the King's Coronation celebration and a Churchyard Working Party which involved many of the villagers coming forward to help. We are also grateful to Gill Shakeshaft who supports us at our Festival services with the music and this year organising and printing our new Carol Service booklet. A big thank you to Sue and David who provided and fitted the beautiful Christmas lights around the Church Porch.

North Cotswold Deanery Synod Report

Three Synods were held during 2023: in March at Lower Slaughter Village Hall, at Great Barrington Village Hall in July and at St Edward's Stow on the Wold in October.

7th **March Synod**: The focus of our March synod was 'Flourishing Creation' and Revd Cate Williams, Diocesan Environmental Engagement Officer, reminded us why as Christians we should put energy, time and money into caring for God's creation. As Christians we are well placed to help bridge the disconnect between humans and creation (noting crises in climate and biodiversity) on a national and international scale. We were encouraged by good news stories from around the deanery about environmental actions and services already taking place. Being part of the eco-church award is an important step which individual parishes can take both to learn more and have a positive impact.

6th July Synod: We heard good news stories from around the Deanery on the theme of 'Flourishing Families' and the Revd Helen Sammon spoke to us about the Sylvanus Lysons charity which supports projects connecting with families and those who are disadvantaged or on the margins of our churches.

12th October Synod: Meeting in a newly refurbished St Edward's, we heard stories of 'Flourishing in our Church Lives' and heard of connections with funeral, wedding and school ministries and how we can all use our gifts to support one another and grow communities. We were reminded that one of our aims is to see our ministries flourishing as a collaboration between clergy and laity and that *'we are all a little broken and a little brilliant'!* There is an evolving Deanery Action Plan for Churches of the North Cotswolds to help shape our planning and create a sustainable and fruitful future.

A number of events which the whole benefice enjoy together have settled themselves into our yearly calendar. In case you're new to Bourton & Clapton (or the Rissingtons) here are a few of our favourite things:

> The Rogation Walk/Benefice Pilgrimage, which takes place in the late spring was the inspiration for the 5 Church Trail leaflet, funded by Clapton.

> Shrove Tuesday Party in 2023 welcomed 80 folks from across the Benefice for food and fun!

> Youth Group which started late in 2022 has grown during the year and now has members from across the Benefice who are led by Rev Hannah and Emily.

It has become a regular fixture in the church calendar meeting monthly in term time throughout the year. The focus is upon creation care and we have had two guided sessions from the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust at Greystones, one looking for bats with echolocators and one identifying birds.

Sessions in between have been craft, games, churchyard species surveying, water quality measuring, joining in with the crib service and Christmas tree festival in Great Rissington and the benefice rogation walk. 7-10 young people of secondary age regularly come along.

Mr Men Fellowship Group

It is with great pleasure that I write the annual APCM report for the Mr Men fellowship group.



We have met very regularly on the first and third Wednesday of each month during the last year, usually one meeting online and one in the bar at The Old Manse in the village per month. Music & Worship

Our pattern of worship in 2023 has continued to follow the rhythm of the lectionary and the church seasons. Rev Rowena has prepared a series of Holy Communion Services for us to use at 11am which make use of lots of the variety available within Common Worship each week. A variety of confessions, creeds and Eucharistic Prayers have been incorporated, so that our worship always feels familiar, yet not the same. We also have an order to use on a First Sunday and a couple of Morning Worship orders called Dwelling in the Word and Dwelling in Creation to call upon when the clergy are unavailable. There are rotas for intercessors, readers and PowerPoint operators each week, so there is quite a lot going on behind the scenes as everyone prepares to play their part! (Janet Turnbull organises this rota - do have a chat to her if you'd like to join in!). We also have a team who administer the chalice at Holy Communion.

I choose the music each week, having reflected on the readings and then make the PowerPoint to use in church. The same PowerPoint is made available via our website to be accessed during the service or by folks joining the livestream from home (bourtonparishchurch.co.uk/sermons). There are also hymnbooks and service booklets available for anyone who finds it hard to follow the service on the big screen. It is a blessing that our music, prayers and sermon come together with such regularity in the moment, given that those involved have often not spoken to each other - only to God - in their preparation! And it is fantastic that we can share Sundays with others around the country and around the world!

A big thank you to Patrick especially, for setting up and operating the livestream each week!

Some facts and figures...

I know that numbers aren't everything, but they can serve as an encouragement – and as we move into vacancy that is, I think, important! An average of 48 adults met each Sunday at 11am during 2023 in St Lawrence (the average was only 42 last year) and I was delighted to discover that we had at least one child under 16 every week too! On one memorable Sunday in August we had 11 youngsters gathered around the colouring table!

- Our 8am congregation averages 8, but as many as 12 at times.
- The 6pm Holy Communion service held on the first Sunday averages 12, but welcomed more than that on 4 occasions during the year.
- The midweek communion at 10am on a Wednesday averages 7, but has been showing an upward trend since coffee started being served afterwards.
- Breakfast Church on a second Saturday averages 10 children and 23 adults.

With PCC's approval, and after the success of the previous year, pews were again moved into the round for Holy Week, and Good Friday Special welcomed 22 children and 37 adults for coffee and hot cross buns followed by a short interactive service. The pews were back in place for Easter Day when 16 children and 100 adults worshipped together. We were delighted when the scouts, cubs, beavers et al joined worship for St George's Day in April (67 adults and 39 children) and are already planning to repeat this in 2024.











Carols on the Green has become a regular occurrence post-COVID and a goodly number wrapped up around the tree for a sing, using our new portable microphone and speaker, followed by Carols by Candlelight in *Church* the following weekend (132 adults and 15 children taking us back to something like pre-COVID attendance levels for the first time). We were glad that the Mr Men fellowship group prepared and served mulled wine for us again. Church felt really busy – we might re-organise drinks distribution next time and get some LED candles or lights for the balcony too!



All our musical usage is reported as part of our Church Copyright Licence every year and we do sing a goodly range of things during the course of 12 months. Those things which we sing most often I think reflect the tone of our worship and our gathered faith community:

WE COME: To God be the glory | At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow | Bless the Lord O my soul Jesus calls us here to meet him | Here and now we're drawn together | In Christ Alone my hope is found

As well as pastoral visiting by clergy, pastoral care continues to be offered through informal networks of support in the village with clergy available should someone want to speak with them.


Times of fellowship over coffee after the Sunday service and after midweek communion as well as Together on Tuesday lunches are all part of growing our community of mutual care and friendship.
